Submission to the Federal Productivity Commission Draft Report

Every day I go to school, I get to encourage, support and -hopefully- inspire young minds to think about how they can share their individual gift(s) with the world. Where the world around them tells them that to be happy they have to buy the right toys/clothes, talk/act/dress the right way etc. to be worthwhile, I get to tell them 'You are special/unique/valuable *just as you are*!' I get to show them that joy comes from giving; from living the truth: that we are each a priceless, never-to-be-repeated miracle. In the United Kingdom, the earliest university-type establishment was probably the College, established by the Celtic preacher St. Illtyd in about AD 500. Oxford University was established by various religious orders. Likewise, Cambridge University was established in 1209 by Christian leaders. Saint Andrews, Scotland's oldest university, was founded principally for the teaching and study of theology. The commitment of these religious founders might be suspect, but many of the later colleges were founded by Bible-believing Christians. The University of Edinburgh had a thoroughly evangelical beginning, being founded under Presbyterian auspices. - Bodie Hodge, Featured in Answers Magazine
