- Forum initiated in response to WACFC 2023 report 'The State of Fashion and Textile Circularity in WA'.
- Funded by Spacecubed's Innovation Society Initiative, supported by Lotterywest.
- 79 attendees from across the WA textile industry including textile supply chain, manufacturers, designers, educators, local government, charitable organisations and researchers.
