



# PART B -GENERAL CONDITIONS AND SPECIFICATIONS

#### 1.0 Description

Tenders are invited and will be received until 4.00 p.m. Thursday 16th May, 1996 for the Supply of a study to assess the impact of Compulsory Competitive Tendering

#### 2.0 Purpose

To produce a working document suitable to a number of regions that could be used to assess the impact of Compulsory Competitive Tendering (CCT) in their local community, economically, socially, and on critical services, and the ways that positive growth can be developed under CCT.

It will address the "regional approach" option for small shires in relation to competitive tendering, monitor the impact of CCT, and establish benchmarks relevant for small isolated communities and develop a model for establishing the impact and effects of CCT.

## 3.0 Project Description:

#### 3.1 Background:

The Loddon Shire is situated in Central Victoria, north west of the City of Greater Bendigo. The Shire consists of the old shires of East Loddon, Gordon, and Korong, and sections of a number of other shires.

Compulsory Competitive Tendering (CCT) forms part of Victoria's response to the need for improved efficiency in local government, through the exposure of Council's functions and service delivery units to market testing and commercial competition.

The region is facing a number of threats to both its economic and social viability with significant pressures from major regional centres. It is believed that the implementation of CCT, could affect the viability of many small rural towns if fully implemented. The results of the loss of work, money, and trained people in these towns could be catastrophic.

The Loddon Shire Council has received funding from the Federal Government under the "Local Government Development Program Grant" scheme.

This study will cover the shires of Loddon, Buloke and Towong with the possibility of other shires also becoming involved.

The project will explore alternatives that could avoid or lessen any negative impacts of CCT through a process of comparative benchmarking of Council Services. The project will study actual and possible impacts of CCT on small rural communities and establish the feasibility of an alternative approach based on benchmarking.

## 3.2 Specific Project Outcomes

- Micro-economic reform
- Best Practices Training
- Improvement to Local Services
- Value for money whilst protecting regional development
- Workplace Reform identification
- Development of pricing mechanisms to improve resource allocation
- Development of partnership arrangements with businesses

#### 3.3 Specific Project Outputs:

- Working and discussion document for other regions
- Training recommendations and basis
- Identification of partnership arrangements with private sector and other government areas
- A practical workable solution for rural areas.

## 4.0 Detailed Tasks/Requirements

- 4.1 Investigate the economic impact of CCT on small rural shires, if local jobs are lost due to work being "won" by major regional centres (e.g. Bendigo, Swan Hill, Kerang) and the impact this would have on critical services and social viability
- 4.2 Investigate actual and potential social impact of CCT on small rural shires, through loss of jobs and through shires competing for work in the private sector. Identify the impact this would have on critical services and social viability.
- 4.3 Determine the critical services that would be effected by population decline and assess support options for these services.
- 4.4 Determine and develop methods of measuring quality of service provided and how this may be impacted upon by CCT.

- 4.5 Investigate "best practice" micro-economic reform packages to minimise any detrimental effects of CCT and maximise benefits, (e.g. sub-regional co-operation ventures).
- 4.6 Investigate cost saving alternatives to work in conjunction with CCT, (e.g. resource sharing with other local government areas and private providers).
- 4.7 Develop alternative benchmarks to CCT (refer specific details provided under "Case Studies"),
- 4.8 Development of baseline information on existing services for both private and public sector.
- 4.9 Develop training basis aimed at achieving required improvements to services (refer specific details provided under, "Training"),
- 4.10 Discuss and develop the above issues and recommend changes.
- 4.11 Investigate partnership arrangement options with the business sector.
- 4.12 Produce a working document that can be used by other small rural shires.

## 5.0 Final Deliverable:

A working document suitable to a number of regions that could be used to assess the impact of CCT on their local community economically, socially, and in terms of service delivery (inclusive of quality. It should also identify ways that positive economic development can be enhanced under CCT.

Two main outcomes are expected - firstly, a clear presentation of results and recommendations, and secondly, the ability of the project to add a valuable tool to Local Governments throughout regional Australia.

#### 6.0 Project Stages & Elements:

#### 6.1 Basic Research

- Quantify services to be tendered under CCT (Year 1, 2, & 3),
- Identification of past providers of these services,
- Identification of items already tendered under CCT,
- Identification of the successful tenderer (and reason for acceptance),
- Percentage of local tenderers and their success rate,
- Selection or criteria for assessing viability of areas.

#### 6.2 Case Studies

A benchmarking study is to be made on the following services:

- (i) Unsealed rural road maintenance.
  Including: re-grading, re-sheeting, roadside clearing, guide post and signs maintenance, minor drainage maintenance.
- (ii) Sealed rural road maintenance Including: re-surfacing, patching, roadside clearing guide post and signs maintenance, minor drainage maintenance
- (iii) Town Planning services
- (iv) Design services
- (v) Financial Services

The services provided by the three shires in the above areas are to be benchmarked across the three Shires with appropriate other non-metropolitan Councils to identify the extent, if any, that the cost and service quality of the three Shires' services fail to match those of other comparable non-metropolitan Councils, or the general market, and to identify any apparent reasons for any such differences.

To identify the alternative methods by which the three Shires may acquire the benchmarked services and assess the economic advantages and disadvantages of contracting out or using in-house services. Such assessments should include the impact upon the Shires' operations, staff, ratepayers, residents, and local businesses.

To recommend in view of the results of the above, what may be the best way of fostering efficiency and effectiveness in the three Shires' service delivery area, while minimising any potential loss of economic activity within the areas serviced by the Shires.

Assist Shire staff to analyse their service delivery processes.

Define appropriate performance indicators for the services.

## 6.3 Interpretation of initial study

Identification of likely impact of various options over three to five year period.

- economically
- socially
- on other local organisations
- people leaving the area,
- Impact of loss of shire staff (immediate and long term),
- Service quality

# 6.4 Development of Projected Viability Formulae

Development of projected viability formulae for areas effected by CCT (i.e. What are the critical core government functions required in a small local government authorities).

# 6.5 Develop micro-economic reform recommendations including alternate benchmarking guidelines

Develop alternative benchmarks for CCT other than conventional proposals and recommendations for micro-economic reform

# 6.6 Monitor and Evaluate Past and Present Opportunities

Monitor and evaluate past and present opportunities for "co-operative" provision of services on a regional/sub-regional basis,

- including documentation of what works well and what has not.

#### 6.7 Training

Develop training basis recommendations aimed at achieving required improvements to service delivery in both the public and private sector including, but not limited to:

- Service analysis and benchmarking techniques
- Price analysis and sourcing methodology
- Other training to be suggested by tenderer (at tender stage, e.g. induction course for potential or up-coming councillors).

# 6.8 Finalise study, working documents and report/models

To finalise study and produce working documents, reports and models including the incorporation of any changes in consultation with the steering committee.

# 7.0 Overall Project Management Arrangements

## 7.1 Responsibilities

The overall responsibility for management of the project will rest with the CEO, Loddon Shire and the Steering Committee. Day to day management will lie with the Manager Economic Development, Loddon Shire.

- 7.2.2 The successful tenderer will provide a single source contact person to report progress against set milestones.

# 7.3 Date of practical completion

The project is to be completed by end of September 1996. Contractors should allow a minimum of 3 weeks for assessment of final draft report by the Steering Committee, plus time for incorporation of any changes, and production of final report.

# 8.0 <u>Commonwealth Department of Environment, Sport & Territories</u> <u>Requirements</u>

- 8.1 The project needs to achieve and link with the strategies and national priorities set by the Local Government Development Program which are as follows:

  - Develop/investigate performance indicators and associated data \*
  - Investigate issues that affect Local Government reform\*

# 9.0 Proposed Financial Management

Contractor will be required to submit a claim sheet for the completion of each project stage with each invoice detailing how time was expended against each project stage.

# 10.0 Tenderer Information

In addition to contractual requirements noted elsewhere submissions should propose how the consultant will tackle the above tasks. It should nominate:

- the partner who will provide supervision for the project
- the extent of their involvement with the work
- names, qualifications, skills and experience of team that will be assisting

## 11.0 Project stage reports.

Project stage reports will be expected. The contractor will be assessed as to quality, content, and timing of these reports against a master target program. On-going assessments will be made to ensure that the project is "on-track", sample of type of report to be used by the contractor must be supplied at tender stage

# 12.0 <u>Variations and Instructions:</u>

- 12.1 The Loddon Shire reserves the right to vary these specifications at any time prior to placement of the contract, and, after discussions with the successful tenderer, after placement of the contract.
- 12.2 Notwithstanding the above, the contractor shall at all times carry out all lawful instructions given by the Loddon Shire Council or its agents or employees. Any failure to carry out such instructions will be deemed to be a breach of contract, and in such an event the Loddon Shire Council reserves the right to cancel the contract effective from the date of the breach.

# 13.0 Ownership of Intellectual Property Rights

All copyright and other intellectual property rights in the material generated by the Contractor in the course of its work under this project shall vest in the Commonwealth and the Loddon Shire Council. The Contractor agrees to assign such copyright and/ or other intellectual property rights to the Commonwealth and the Loddon Shire Council when any work has been paid for, and any Agreement eventuating from this tender, or any negotiations thereafter, shall operate as an assignment of such ownership and copyright.

## 14.0 Formal Instrument of Agreement

The contract will be evidenced by a formal instrument of agreement which, will be entered into by the parties, following notification of the acceptance of tender and award of contract.

## **PART C - TENDER EVALUATION**

#### 1.0 <u>Introduction</u>

Each tender submission will be assessed and evaluated by a panel to determine the sutability of the tender submissions, to fairly evaluate each tender bid to provide products and services to Loddon Shire Council for the term of the Contract period and to report to Council with a recommendation.

#### 2.0 <u>Selection Criteria</u>

The following are the evaluation criteria listed in order of importance:

- \* Economic benefit to Council
- \* Performance history
- Knowledge & background in compulsory competitive tendering
- Quality of performance plan/program agenda
- \* Ability to meet time lines

# Appendix G

Extract Decision of NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption (see chapter 9)

#### LOCAL SUPPLIER PREFERENCE

A government board called for expressions of interest to submit "design and construct" tenders for a recreational facility in a small country town. Four of the respondents were selected to submit detailed tenders, because their experience and credentials were considered sufficient to enable them to complete the job successfully. Cost and design considerations thus became the major factors in deciding the tender.

One tenderer was located in the town and the other three were at regional centres up to 200 kilometres away.

The local tenderer got the job, at a price which was higher than the other three by 5%, 10% and 40% respectively. One of the unsuccessful tenderers complained to the board, and was given some reasons for its decision which mainly related to design details. However, in the same letter to this tenderer, the board also stated that the tenders submitted by the successful tenderer and the firm making the complaint were "generally the same" when all aspects of the total project were considered. The letter concluded that, as the funds for the project were not government funds but were raised locally, the board could accept any tender it wished.

The board chairperson also wrote to the appropriate authority on these matters to explain that, as the funds would have to be raised in the local area, the majority of board members had decided to allocate the project to the local tenderer.

The ICAC acknowledged that local supplier preference may be an assessment criterion for contractor selection but advised that caution should be exercised in the way it is used. It was clearly unfair to use local supplier preference when the tenderers had not been informed of this fact in advance nor been given information about the manner in which it would operate.

Local supplier preference policies exist in documented or undocumented form in many areas. Their stated objective is to benefit the local economy. At the State and Federal level also, governments have occasionally chosen to give an advantage to Australian industry when allocating government contracts.

The public is entitled to expect that government agencies get good value for public money. If local supplier preference policies are adopted, the costs and the benefits should be assessed and made public. It should not automatically follow that money raised locally go to a local supplier.

A local supplier preference policy, if poorly designed and implemented, can lead to allegations of partiality or other corruption. It can discourage out-of-town suppliers from bidding, and thus reduce competition. It can also encourage local suppliers to pad their bids in expectation of a local preference "cushion".

Local supplier preference policies may not always achieve their objective of boosting the local economy. Using local rather than out-of-town suppliers may add very little to the local economy if most of the revenue goes elsewhere. Alternative ways to boost the local economy should also be considered.

Government agencies must make their own decision on whether to adopt a local supplier preference policy. Those which decide on a policy of this type should clearly document how the policy will operate in all situations and make it explicit in evaluation criteria. They should estimate the costs and set acceptable limits in advance, and state the policy openly to tenderers and the public.

They should also monitor regularly such factors as cost to the agency, impact on competitiveness and success in achieving the policy's objectives, and report their findings to the public.
